- 1. Minutes for the meeting of August 9, 2018, were approved as submitted. Moved by Judy Fink, seconded by Bill Schmidt. Unanimous.

- 6. A report was given about the recent meeting of representatives from regional conservation groups where co-sponsoring and coordinating activities was discussed. There was strong support among the groups for coordinated activities, including communicating about each group's activities. A follow up meeting will precede the Regional Conservation Commissions meeting November 15 at 5. (See below.)
- 7. Regional Conservation Commission Meeting: Dummerston will host the semiannual meeting November 15 in the Dummerston Church. Potluck at 6, meeting from 7-8:30. The focus will be in issues raised in advance by specific groups.
- 8. The Prospect Pasture Invasives workday is cancelled. The commission, in collaboration with the Prospect Hill Trustees, is working on a plan to control the invasives that may include purchase of equipment and assistance from the town cres.
- 9. Rare and endangered plants: a patch of Three Bird Orchid was identified by a logger and forester, and steps taken to preserve the plants.

10. Sightings: turkeys, immature Red Tail hawk, lots of different caterpillars, monarch butterflies and hummingbirds still here, bears
